Your cardiologist has recommended that you transfer to an Adult Cardiology Centre. Although you may feel well, it is essential to link you with an adult hospital for ongoing monitoring of your condition for as long as this is necessary and possibly throughout your adult life.

Information in this brochure is designed to provide you with helpful information and to provide answers to common questions.

Please ensure that if you do not receive adequate information once transferred, that you DO ask the Royal Melbourne Hospital (RMH) staff.



# Getting there

## Car park

Limited parking is available at the RMH car park. It is open between 6am and 11pm. Rates are based on commercial parking fees. Pensioners and health care cardholders are entitled to a discount on payment. Refer to the sign in the car park for details if you require the use of a wheelchair. Limited street parking with a one hour limit is also available in Grattan Street.

As the clinic can take up the majority of the morning, public transport is strongly recommended where possible.


## The Hospital is situated near several tram routes:

No. 19 to North Coburg and No. 59 to Airport West.

Tram leaves from corner of Flinders and Elizabeth Streets.

In the CBD – alight at Grattan Street.

**Zoo parking** – Elliot Avenue, Parkville (Melways Ref: 43 E1). Melbourne Zoo is located only minutes north from the city centre, within Royal Park. Tram 55 runs back down to RMH – alight at corner of Flemington Road and Grattan Street.

# Before your first visit to RMH, you will require:

- A referral from your Paediatric Cardiologist will be made directly to the Congenital Heart Centre at the RMH with attached documentation. A copy of the letter can be sent to you if you so desire. This referral will only last for 3 months from the initial appointment, therefore you will need to obtain a further referral from your GP. This can be made valid for 12 months or longer depending on your health care needs. This clinic is bulk billed and you will need your Medicare card for the first visit.
- An appointment will be sent out directly from the RMH to you, the patient. The appointment will be organized within 6 months of the referral to enable the RMH to meet up and discuss with you your ongoing care and frequency of further appointments.

# Please contact RMH outpatients if you have not received an appointment within six months. Telephone 9342 8899.

- 3 Patients living in the metropolitan area will have an ECG on the day of appointment and an Echocardiogram on a separate day (usually one week prior to appointment).
- 4 Patients residing in the country area (outside the metropolitan area) will have all their required tests on the day of appointment (wherever possible).
- Patients residing over a 100kms away from Melbourne will be able to obtain assistance through the Victorian Patient Travel Assistance Service (VPTAS). Forms may be obtained through your local Centrelink or Department of Human Services offices in your region, as well as your local GP

# An important final word...

Transferring to an adult hospital is a sign that you are growing up and starting to manage your own appointments, prescriptions and medications and depending less on your parents/caregivers. It is important for both you and your parents to recognize this as you will find that staff working in adult hospitals will generally focus on you, the patient and less on other adults accompanying you.

Please make certain that you ask lots of questions and if you are not too sure about the answer, ask again! A good tip is to write down questions before your visit to the clinic.
